Inquiries are invited to publish in Volumes 6 and 7 of Current Ornithology. The goal of this edited series is to serve the international ornithological community by publishing in book form the best synopses, reviews, syntheses, and position statements in avian research. Each volume is to contain substantive papers by principal researchers. Preference is given to current and fast-developing topics in ornithology, as well as to literature reviews and critiques of active theories and areas of research. Volumes appear every 12 to 18 months. The series is published by Plenum Publishing Corp., New York, and is distributed world-wide. Papers are in English.

Prospectuses, not completed manuscripts, should be submitted first. Send a one or two-page description of the proposed paper giving: (1) author(s), address(es), and phone number(s); (2) the principal topics, hypothesis or areas of research to be addressed and their significance; and (3) the principal audience (types of researchers likely to benefit from the work); to

TAURACO: Journal of Afrotropical Ornithology: Revue d'Ornithologie de l'Afrique tropicale

"Tauraco" will publish original and review papers, in English or French, relating to Afrotropical birds, particularly field studies. It will cover sub-Saharan Africa, south-western Arabia, Madagascar and other Indian Ocean islands. Papers will be refereed by an editorial board, all of whom have considerable Afrotropical experience: R.J. Dowsett (editor), Judy Oglethorpe (assistant editor), Norman Arlott (art editor), C.H. Fry, D.N. Johnson, M. Louette, R.B. Payne, D.E. Pomeroy, J.-M. Thiollay. They will ensure that papers are well-illustrated, so that authors can present their results in the most effective manner.

"Tauraco" will appear initially twice a year, but the size and frequency of issues will be increased if there is sufficient support. Delay between receipt and publication of papers will be kept to a minimum. The first issue will be published in March 1988, and will include: a review paper by P. Berthold on recent research into Palaearctic-African warbler migration; first of a series of analyses of all available ringing recoveries involving Palaearctic migrants in the Afrotropics; papers on vocalisations and taxonomy of turacos; the miombo woodland avifauna of Angola and forest birds in Kenya; species relationships of Nesillas warblers in the Indian Ocean islands.

As a service to "Tauraco" subscribers, Hilary Fry's Afrotropical bibliography has been computerized: for a small fee, printouts may be ordered of the literature relating to particular countries, research fields or avian families, published since 1975.
